



## Smart Start ABCD Project Begins

**Goal to improve quality of child development services in primary care medical practices**

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Smart Start of New Hanover County and Community Care of the Lower Cape Fear (CCLCF) will implement Smart Start Assuring Better Child Health and Development (ABCD) to improve the quality of child development services in primary care medical practices. Operating within CCLCF's six county service region, the goal of the project is to increase the number of children ages birth to five who receive high quality developmental screenings in the context of their "medical home," identifying children with developmental or behavioral concerns, and making referrals to early intervention and other appropriate community resources.

A CCLCF Health Check Coordinator will work directly with up to 14 select medical practices that agree to participate. The coordinator will assess current processes, provide training and on-site technical assistance to physicians and their staff in integrating developmental screening and referral activities into well-child visits. In addition, the coordinator will ensure that these practices provide accurate and timely information and education to families regarding their child's development.

Led by Smart Start of New Hanover County, the ABCD project is implemented in collaboration with Community Care of Lower Cape Fear and is supported by the Race to the Top – Early Learning Challenge grant.
